A Brief History of Horton Chapel Church of Christ

A newspaper article from the Greenville Leader states that Horton Chapel dates back to 1912, when J. L. (Jake) Hines conducted a revival in what is now known as the Union Ridge Baptist Church building. During that meeting two people, Gertia Fulkerson and Jenny Jones, were baptized. From this small beginning, many things have transpired throughout the years.

The building where this first meeting took place was donated by Mose Stanley. Mr. Stanley and Bill Horton were brothers-in-law. The two men married sisters. No information as to the names of the sisters has been located. It was donated to the community to be used for local functions. It was used by the General Baptist and the Church of Christ. It may have been used for other functions, but there are no known records to the fact. For certain in the beginning the Church of Christ met on Sunday mornings one week and the General Baptist met the next week. It is quite likely an evening service didn't evolve until years later, when better transportation would have made getting to worship more accessible to its members. Once that happened, the General Baptist would meet on Sunday morning one week and then Sunday evening the next week with the Church of Christ rotating the same schedule.

Eventually conflicts and differences of opinions arose over the use of the donated Union Ridge Community Building. The plans for a new meeting place to be erected came into existence. In 1931 Bill Horton donated the land to construct what is now known as Horton Chapel Church of Christ. Land for the cemetery was also donated.

The original portion of the building was erected of logs donated by church members and families of the community. A sawmill was brought onto location and many logs were sawed for the making of a new building. No one was hired to do any of the back-breaking work. Many members of this young church took their turn driving nails to have their own place of worship.

The first meeting was held even before the windows were installed! On that night its members and visitors sat on seats made from rough-cut lumber, which had been hand planed. C.K. Watkins preached to a full house that night so long ago, possibly 1932. This was just an auditorium, and there were no classrooms at this time. On Sunday mornings when classes took place, teachers took their students to designated corners and taught. To be sure, if you misbehaved in class, you could depend on getting corrected when you got home. There was no way to deny if you'd been bad, because Mom and Dad heard it all.

There was no electricity in the building at this time. The lighting was from coal oil lanterns. The watchful eyes of the caretaker kept the flames adjusted, so as not to burn too high or too low. Originally there was no need for indoor plumbing. The outhouses were located in back and slightly to the edge of the church yard. The heating system for this building was a pot-bellied stove stoked by the caretaker, Herman Horton. If you were cold, you sat up close to the front and if you were hot, you moved toward the back! In the winter months there probably were not too many backseat sitters! In the summer months one hoped to sit near an opened window with a hand fan that was donated by a local funeral home.

The article from the Greenville Leader states additions of two classrooms were made in the late 1940's. Some years later another addition was made which included a baptistry, nursery, more

classroom space and restrooms. The next addition was completed in April, 1968. This consisted of a classroom annex featuring a folding curtain that, when opened, would increase seating by one third. There were also two additional classrooms and office space added at this time. There have been other constructions throughout the years including a fellowship hall, which was completed in the fall of 1986. This would make having dinner on the grounds obsolete!

The outward appearance of the building is not the only change Horton Chapel has seen. The Lord's Supper was once taken using only one cup. Each member would drink from the same cup. (Those of us who are germ-sensitive would have a second thought on the subject!) When they broke bread, they used homemade, unleavened bread. This budding congregation eventually adopted the use of more than one cup and unleavened bread which was made available through vendors. There was no passing of the plate for the weekly contributions. During the closing song, members would get up and place their meager contributions on the front table. These contributions often yielded \$4.00 to \$5.00 from the entire congregation!


Roy McElwain was the first song leader that most everyone remembers at Horton Chapel. He started as a young man and taught any others who took an interest. He taught his nephew, Ernest McElwain, a few of his song-leading skills. Ernest says he still remembers being nervous in his early song-leading days. He also remembers looking at the congregation and seeing people chewing gum!

The Horton Chapel congregation has had many ministers throughout the years. During the very early years of the Church, the preachers were called "circuit riders". These preachers rode horse back or walked to services. They often spoke to one congregation one Sunday and another the next. This placed them once a month with each congregation. Their pay usually consisted of the Sunday morning offering. As stated earlier that was possibly \$4.00 or \$5.00!





Moore, Joe Wells, Ernest McElwain and Marvin Wells, Sr. The current deacons are Loyd Moore, Wayne Wells, Tim Lyons, Shelby Heltsley, Bill Henson, Grayson Wells, and Jay McElwain. The present minister is Paul G. Moore.

According to a Greenville Leader article, Horton Chapel is 95 years in the making. Horton Chapel Church of Christ is a family. We are brothers and sisters in Christ. 


Logs much like these were used to build the first building.






A sawmill much like this one was used to saw the lumber for the new place of worship.


Marvin Wells, Sr. & Ernest McElwain



The following is a letter penned by Truly Joines. She mailed it to Joe Wells and it is dated 1-5-1989. It has been typed as she hand wrote the words. The letter has been reduced and copied onto this document so everyone can read and enjoy. The subject matter is regarding the early years of the church.

Truly Joines' letter

In the earley 19_100 hunders J.L. Hines come to this part of the country and preached at Union Ridge he was put out at the window and put in Jail at Greenville Granville Horton Willias Mohon wint and bailed him out he babtized seural people Dick Fulkerson Jim Fulkerson Bill & Luro Penrod Ginnie Jones Bill & Ellen Horton Gurdie & Lilie Fulkerson thoront & Elsie Fulkerson. Granville & Maudie Dent & Tennie Horton Jim Barbee preached 19_23 Roy Hide & Willard Dearmond held a meeting Roy McElwain & Truly was babtized at Clarks bridge we meet in the meeting house at union Ridge. Jim Barbee furnished the money to buy windows, nails, doors roofing the Hortons Chapel was built in around 19_30 or 31 R.E.L. Taylor held a meeting behind Union Ridge meeting house babtized Sueral people.

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The Horton Chapel Family

William (Bill) and Mary Horton (1859-1939) (1863-1938)

William Horton, known to family and friends as Bill, contributed much to Horton Chapel. His generosity brought about the donation of the Horton Chapel property. He and his wife, Mary Horton, were proud to see the finished building, but were only able to worship a short while before their deaths. They and their children were some of the first members at Horton Chapel. The couple had six children: Denton (Dent), Granville, and Herman Horton, Lillie Horton Fulkerson, Elise Horton Fulkerson, and Ellen Horton Sumner. Their daughter, Ellen, married Marion Sumner and lived in what was once known as Gus. They worshiped at Mt. Moriah Church of Christ. Ellen is laid to rest in the Horton Chapel cemetery. (4/10/1887-5/11/1979) The remaining children worshiped at Horton Chapel, with many contributions along the way. There are no pictures available for Bill and Mary Horton, Elise Fulkerson, or Marion and Ellen Sumner.




Granville and Maude Horton (1884 — 1962) (1888 — 1976)

Granville Horton married Maude Mohon. She was a sister to Tennie Mohon Horton. He was a son to Bill Horton. The couple had three children: Eurie H. Wood Mallory, Nellie Horton McPherson and Ernest Horton. Granville and Maude lived across the road from the Horton Chapel building. Maude is remembered for her kindness. She enjoyed raising a big garden and always canned her produce. Anytime someone needed food, she was there to lend a hand. She housed and fed many visiting preachers until others were able to help with the job. Granville was one of the men to help with the backbreaking work of the new building. Their eldest daughter, Nellie, and son, Ernest, had jobs that took them to the state of Missouri. When Granville

died and Maude was no longer able to care for herself, she joined her children in Missouri. She lived with her daughter, Nellie, until her passing. She was brought back to Kentucky to be laid by her husband in Horton Chapel Cemetery. Their daughter, Eurie (1906—1998) is buried here alongside her husband, Everett Mallory (1909—1968).

Ephraim Hudnall married Peruvia Jones, niece of Frank Jones. Their children were Frailey, Hazel, Bernice, Esma and others, of whom no names or information could be located. They had two daughters to marry Church of Christ preachers. Bernice married Jim Cox,

who has preached for the Horton Chapel congregation. Hazel married Harold Savely, who has preached meetings for the Horton Chapel family. Their daughter, Esma, married Ernest Horton, son of Granville and Maude Horton. Hazel and Harold have a son, Edward, buried here. (Born and Died 7-18-1952). Their grandson, Jerry Horton, is an elder at his home congregation in Missouri. Ephraim and Peruvia were members during the early years of Horton Chapel.





Dent, Tennie and Walter Horton




Tennie Horton (1893 — 1974)



Denton or Dent Horton (1888 — 1944)


Denton or Dent Horton, as everyone knew him, was a son of Bill Horton. He was married to Tennie Mohon Horton, a sister to Maude Mohon Horton. Dent and Tennie had 3 sons: Walter, Howard and Raymond. Dent earned his living delivering mail on a horse. Tennie was a homemaker. Dent and Elbert Fulkerson contributed the first \$200 toward the building fund for the Horton Chapel building, matching each other's donations of \$100. He was anxious to see a building that his children could be proud of. Their son, Howard, was a military man and raised his family as such. He was laid to rest with military honors in a cemetery in the state of Connecticut. No information or pictures are available for their son Raymond. Walter and his wife, Loretta, were longtime members at Horton Chapel. Tennie was a faithful member at Horton Chapel, often seen walking to worship services from her home, located about a half mile from the Horton Chapel building. On occasions, she did ride to worship services with her son and daughter-in-law, Walter and Loretta.

Walter Horton married Loretta Baugh and they had three daughters: Billy Horton Knight, Judy Horton Fleming and Deborah Horton, who died at birth (3-1948). Walter and Loretta

worshipped at Horton Chapel for many years with their two young daughters, Billy and Judy. After Walter's father, Dent, passed, they often gave his mother, Tennie, a ride to worship services. Walter and Loretta's home was located in Beechmont, KY. During the couple's last years, they worshipped with the congregation at Beechmont because of convenience.

Herman and Nora Horton (3/28/1896 - 11/6/1973) (12/3/1900 - 9/6/1985)


Herman Horton was a son of Bill Horton. He and Nora Mallory Horton had one son, Wilbur, and an adopted daughter, Madgeline Norman. Madgeline is laid to rest in Horton Chapel Cemetery (4/22/1927 - 7/7/1959). She attended Horton Chapel, but no pictures are available of her. Herman and Nora contributed much to the Horton Chapel family. They were quiet and were seen doing work, from which many reaped the benefits. It was Herman who built the fires in the winter months and raised the windows in the summer months. Herman and his son. Wilbur, were often seen adjusting the coal oil lanterns during the evening worship services. Nora, when preparing the Lord's Supper, always made the unleavened bread. Venders were not readily available for groups to purchase unleavened bread. She or some other member probably made the grape juice since access to the grocery was just as difficult. They each had a kind heart and were faithful members of Horton Chapel.

Wilbert Horton married Juanita Hudnall and they adopted a son, Johnny Ray Horton. They assumed the job of caretakers for Horton Chapel when Wilbert's parents were no longer able to do the job. They continued doing jobs, from which others reaped the benefits. The building was always clean and comfortable for its members. Juanita prepared the Lord's Supper as did her mother-in-law before her. She had conveniences which were unavailable to the former preparer. There was no longer a need to scratch since vendors were available for purchasing



whatever goods were needed to get the job completed. At the onset of doing this job, Juanita would have to wash all the little juice cups by hand. She was overjoyed when the disposable cups were purchased. They were good neighbors, quiet and kind to their fellow man.


Johnny Horton married and he and his wife had one son, Johnny Lee, who lives near McHenry, KY. Johnny lost his life in an automobile accident. He attended Hughes-Kirk School in Beechmont, KY and joined the U.S. Army shortly after graduation. His service was during peace

time. He was an only child and his parents grieved heavily upon his death. Johnny became a member of the church while he was in high school.



Amos Valentine (Tobe) and Ellen Sullivan McElwain (1857—1926) (12/7/1873—3/29/1933)

Tobe and Ellen Sullivan McElwain were members during the era when the Church of Christ met in the Union Ridge building. Ellen was a faithful member of the church. Tobe was baptized shortly before his death. They were wed on June 13, 1889. There were 9 children from this union. They had 4 boys and 5 girls: Thornt, Clay, Roy & Herschel; May Slaughter, Ora Stinson, Ethel Smith, Ada Barrett and Ollie Joines. Ellen was one of the first people in this area who died from cancer. They are laid to rest in Union Ridge Cemetery. Amos Valentine McElwain was known to everyone as Tobe. He was born in 1857 and he passed in 1926. Ellen Sulliven McElwain's time on this earth was December 7, 1873 to March 29, 1933. Horton Chapel Cemetery was not in existence at the time of their deaths. It was then just a wooded area. All 9 children are deceased and buried in Horton Chapel Cemetery.

Herschel McElwain was a son of Amos Sullivan Valentine (Tobe) and Ellen McElwain. Herschel and Eva Joines were united in marriage Feb. 4, 1920. They had 3 sons: Ernest, Carl and Arlis, and 2 daughters, Nell M. Casebier and Donnie M. Lynn. Carl and Arlis are buried in Florida. Herschel and Eva were long-time members of the Horton Chapel congregation. They worshipped with the church in the Union Ridge building and had their part in the construction of the building on its present site. Both were faithful members and an encouragement to their children. Their eldest, Ernest, still plays a major role in the Horton Chapel family. Their daughters are living away from the Muhlenberg County area.

Ernest McElwain and Christobel Winn were married Dec. 13, 1938. Christobel was born Oct. 10, 1918 and passed Jan. 29, 2007. They were fortunate enough to have 68 years together. They have 2 daughters: Anita M. Crafton and Linda M. Moore. They have 3 grandchildren and one great-grandchild. Christobel never worked outside the home. She took her jobs

as wife, mother and friend to others very seriously. She was a comfort to many. She was a faithful Christian who fed many visiting preachers throughout the years. She never wanted to miss a worship service. The last time she was in the hospital, she was released on a Sunday morning and was in worship service that same Sunday evening! Ernest is a longtime elder at Horton Chapel. Ernest has lead singing for many years and encouraged many youngsters to follow his footsteps. Loyd Moore, a son-in-law, is serving as a deacon at Horton Chapel. Their grandson-in-law, Bill Henson, is also serving as a deacon. Christobel is the last member we have lost at the time of this writing. She is sadly missed by all.



Roy and Minnie Mallory McElwain (1890 — 1963) (1889 — 1970)

Roy McElwain was a son of Tobe McElwain. Roy married Minnie Mallory and six children were born from that union. There were five girls: Flossie M. Pogue, Truly M. Joines, Mary Ellen M. Mohon Bray, Lucille M. Cabbage and Ruth Ann McElwain. Ruth Ann died at the young age of 7 from bronchial pneumonia (11/30/1928 - 3/23/1936). The couple had one son, Henry Amos. Those who knew Roy would often call him Pappy. He and his wife, Minnie, brought all their children to worship services at Horton Chapel. Pappy did his part in the construction of the Horton Chapel building, as so many of the other members had done. Roy was one of the first men to serve as elder for Horton Chapel. He served for many years. He was a dedicated song leader and taught his children to sing. His daughters are remembered for their fine alto voices. His singing skills did not stop with his family. He often lead singing throughout Muhlenberg, Butler and Logan counties. He was often seen driving his 1936 pickup truck, carrying loads of people over dusty roads during the summer months. Pappy had a great influence on many people. He has been referred to as a peace maker. He and Minnie, or Mammy, as she was so often called, were always at worship services.

Mammy was a quiet, reserved Christian woman. She took her duties as homemaker, mother and wife seriously. She always waited on Pappy hand and foot. When Sunday morning came, Pappy always found his "Sunday best" ready to wear to their weekly worship services at Horton Chapel.

Mary Ellen McElwain Mohon married Hershel Bray. They lived in Louisville and were members of the Expressway Church of Christ upon their deaths. There were no children from this union. Mary Ellen had two sons from a previous marriage: Howard and Neil Mohon. Mary Ellen is buried in Russellville, KY alongside her husband. No pictures are available of her husband.

Flossie McElwain Pogue and Edgar Pogue

(7/29/1908 - 2/16/1992)

(1/16/1908 - 4/11/1971)

Flossie McElwain Pogue married Edgar Pogue and they had three children: Jack, Shelby Gene and Estil Pogue Bierd. They and their family worshiped at Horton Chapel, until they moved to Louisville, Ky. Edgar once served as an elder and taught Sunday School class at Horton Chapel. He also helped with the construction of the Horton Chapel building. He and Flossie worshiped with the Outer Loop Church of Christ in Louisville at the time of their deaths. There are no pictures available for Edgar Pogue.

Henry Amos McElwain and Francis Stinson McElwain

(9/22/1911 - 8/24/1965)

(7/13/1913 - 7/28/2003)

Henry Amos McElwain, the only son of Roy and Minnie McElwain, married Francis Stinson. They had several children from this union. No names are available and most of the children are now deceased. Henry Amos worked, at one time, for his Uncle Thornt McElwain, as a truck driver. He eventually got a job in Owensboro, KY working at a canning factory. Francis' family are the Stinsons, who worship at Mt. Moriah Church of Christ off Forgy Mill Road near Penrod, KY. Their infant daughter, Phyllis Ann, is buried beside them at Horton Chapel Cemetery (4-1949).

Lucille McElwain married John H. Cabbage. They had 5 children: Alton Roy, Walter Lee, Brenda Cabbage Federspille, Diane Cabbage Thompson and Sheila Cabbage Wolf. Their infant son, Walter Lee, died with pneumonia (10/2/1941 — 2/9/1942). Their daughter, Diane, was killed in a car accident in 1996. No pictures are available for either children. The couple worshipped at Horton Chapel with their young son, Alton, until a job making airplanes with Curtis Wright took them to Louisville in the mid 1940's. Everyone who knew John always called him Johnny. He was a tool and die maker for General Electric for 10 years. He then went into business for himself. He retired as a tool and die maker from his place of business. Lucille worked for a short while at R.L. White Printing Company as a supervisor. She retired and resumed her duties as homemaker. Johnny and Lucille were good parents, continuing to worship the Lord with the Highland Park Church of Christ until their deaths. In 1993, their son, Alton and his wife, Joyce, returned to Muhlenberg County and continue to worship with the Horton Chapel family.



Truly and Guy Joines (9/28/1909 — 2/23/1992) (6/24/1902 — 9/20/1990)



Guy and Truly were big influences on their family, as two of their sons became Church of Margie's Christ ministers. husband, Forrest Rhoads, is also a Church of Christ minister. Their daughter, Shirley and her with the North Main congregation

husband, Eugene, worship with the North Main congregation in Greenville, KY. Jimmy is also a member of the church in Georgia. Guy and Truly were devoted Christians. They were always at worship services, adhering to Proverbs 22:6 which states: "Train up a child in the way he should go and when he is old, he will not depart from it". Guy and Truly were hard workers and were usually found wherever work was to be done.

Curse words were never heard uttered from Guy's lips and should his children try, he was always there to correct them. Truly housed and fed many visiting preachers during gospel meetings, which sometimes lasted for two weeks. Guy was a private person and Truly was always giving of herself.


Zelmer and Mae McElwain Slaughter (5/25/1903 — 2/15/1965) (6/26/1906 — 1991)





they lived at home. Elbert's father, Richard, and stepmother, Mary Dee, are buried in Horton Chapel Cemetery. Richard, known to all as Dick, was born 4/22/1860 and passed 4/16/1938. Mary Dee, or Dee as everyone called her, was born 5/12/1864 and died within months of Uncle Dick on 11/15/1938. Elbert's mother, Elizabeth Fulkerson, is buried in McLean Co., KY. 





Teddy and Joel Jones (1931 — 1988)

Fred and Cena were married in 1930. They had 2 boys: Teddy and Joel. Teddy is deceased and buried in a cemetery in Indiana. Joel and Teddy came with their parents to Horton Chapel until they moved away from home. Joel's home is in Indiana. Fred and Cena were good Christian people. Fred taught an adult Bible class. It has been said he was asked to teach because he couldn't stay awake in class! Fred was a sawmill man like his father before him. Fred and Cena always gave of themselves. They were faithful members and good neighbors.



Myrtle Myers Brewer (9/26/1876 — 6/18/1968)

Myrtle Myers Brewer was the first member of the Brewer family placed in the Horton Chapel Cemetery. Her request was for her twin sons, Howard and Hawell, to be buried on each side of her. Although not a member at Horton Chapel, she was a member of the church. She often visited Horton Chapel while in Howard's home.

Howard and Melvie moved to the Belton area in Feb. 1960. They raised most of their family on the old George Reynolds'

farm. The two oldest children were married and had homes of their own at this time. There were 9 boys and 3 girls in their family. This family saw their share of tough times. Melvie was a humble Christian woman. She had lots of patience with her family and fellow man. She never worked outside the home, but she wore many hats along the road. She was the chief guidance of her family in the way of the Lord. She was often seen walking her young family to worship services. It was Howard's family that led her in the path to becoming a Christian. Shortly before Howard's passing, he was heard to say his biggest regret in life was not supporting Melvie in bringing her family to worship services. Melvie's biggest heartaches were seeing 3 of her children laid to rest before her. Bobby was their first child to die (from cancer). She lost





Tommy and Betty Lyons began attending Horton Chapel Church of Christ around 1968. Vergil Joines was preaching at that time. They attended until their deaths. Other preachers who preached during their time here with us included: Harold Sain, Garry Hill and Paul Moore. Tommy was employed by the Muhlenberg Co. Board of Education and served as teacher, coach, principal and Deputy Superintendent. Tommy also served in the U.S. Army and was a veteran of the Korean War. Betty worked many years for Dr. Brown and Dr. Mayes. Betty co-taught a Bible class with Janet Wells for several years before her passing. Tommy and Betty have 1 child, Tim, who is married to Paula D. Lyons. They have 2 children: Thomas Lawson and Mattie Beth Lyons. They are presently attending Tim is currently serving as a deacon for Horton Chapel.

During the war, Clara is remembered for purchasing a car and bringing her parents to worship. Her husband, Dallas, is deceased and laid to rest in Horton Chapel Cemetery (5/31/1915 — 4/22/2005). French and Nancy's son, Carson, was married to Betty Arrendell. He is deceased and buried in Decatur, IL where he and his family lived for many years. French and Nancy attended Horton Chapel during the years they were raising their young family in the 1920's to 1940's.




Kenley and Lena Harper (9/14/1901— 9/18/1988) (1/5/1907— 10/2/1986



The times they worshipped with the Horton Chapel congregation is unclear; a probable guess would be the late 1950's and maybe the early 1960's.

William Marshall Hunt was born Oct. 19, 1927 and passed on Aug. 11, 1986. Ellvenia A. Hunt was born Feb. 25, 1929 and died Jan. 23, 2002. William and Ellvenia Arnold were united in marriage on Dec. 20, 1944. They had 3 children: Ray, Rita and Wanda. Wanda has a son-in-law buried at Horton Chapel Cemetery: Justin Ryan Pruden was born April 1, 1988 and killed in an automobile accident June 3, 2007.

Rita Callihand was a daughter of William and Venia Hunt. Her date of birth was April 27, 1760 and her passing was Nov. 27, 2002. She married David Callihand on April 17, 1986. Rita has one daughter, Laura Beth Bennison from a previous marriage. Rita's untimely demise was from a heart attack.

Verlon Hudnall (1926 -1999) – sister to Juanita Hudnall Horton

Clyde Hudnall (1899 -1965) and Euva Hudnall (1901-1993) – Juanita H. Horton's parents

Terry W. Whitaker (1950 - 1982) - son of Marcia Whitaker — Marcia was a sister to Juanita Horton

Wendell Wayne Wells (1941-1942) – son of W. G. Wells, who was a brother to T. R. Wells, Sr.

Helen Louise Hope (1923-1994) – mother of Wendell Wayne Wells

Hestel Morgan (1889-1963) and **Mabel Morgan** (1909-1989) – parents of Patty Horton — Patty is the wife of Jerry Horton. Jerry is the grandson of Granville and Maude Horton.

William Junior Morgan "Bill" (1926-1978) – son of Hestel and Mabel Morgan

Ricky Wayne Puckett (1971-1991) – grandson of Bill Morgan

Gus Belcher (10-1-1905) – He was a member of the Hillcrest Church of Christ, in Dunmor, Ky. Gus was the grandfather of Courtney English Wells.

George Sikes (1891-1949 and Lillian Sikes (1906-1995) – Members at one time at Horton Chapel. They lived behind the old one-room school house off Union Ridge Road.

George Sikes II (944-2007) – son of George and Lillian Sikes

Minnie Francis Yeckering (1931-2005) – There is no known information on her

Nellie Smith (1892-1980) and Vergil Smith (1877-1949) - Nellie worshipped with the Horton Chapel family along with a son

Bruce W. Smith (1915-1945) – son of Nellie and Vergil Smith. He was a WWII Veteran

Henry Clay Smith (1883-1957) and Ida Kimmel Smith (1890 -1979) – No information other than they were never members of the Horton Chapel family and were from somewhere in the Belton area.

Ezra Smith (1909) – possibly a child of Henry and Ida Smith

Dessie Winn ((1893-1981) and Morgan Winn (1891-1946) - cousins to Christobel McElwain

Aunt Luro Penrod and Uncle Bill Penrod (1956) – There is little known information on this couple. They were once members at Horton Chapel. They were relatives of Jim Barbee. The only date on their rock states they died in 1956. They once lived across Rocky Creek near George Bowersock's sawmill.

Unknown grave – There is a space located between Roger Keith Krone, Jr. and Walter Lee Cabbage marked with a broken concrete block. It's presumed to be a grave. There is no known information

Roger Keith Krone Jr. (1/20/1957 — 12/16/1963) – No information available

Jerry R. Mihelcic (No dates given.) - No information available

Watha K. Mihelcic (No dates given.) - No information available

James Howard Krone Jr. (8-19-1990 to 9-9-1990) – No information available.

Louis Sims (1888-1963) and Eva Sims (1893-1989) and Howard Sims (1912-2004) – The only information available is these three all came from the same family and were not members at Horton Chapel.

Dale Keith Smith (11-14-1950 to 11-16-1950) – The only known information is that this was an infant.

Mary A. Hardison (1903-1966) and William O. Hardison (1899 – 1986) William went by his middle name Oscar. He was a song leader and long time member at the Drakesboro congregation. He married Nonnie Brewer years after Mary died. Nonnie was a sister to Howard Brewer.

Wesley A Porter (1916-1982) and Marion A Porter (1919-????) – They were both members at Horton Chapel. When Wesley died Marion went to California and no information as to whether she has passed or not. If she has it is assumed she was buried there.

A.L. Ferguson (1866-1956) – Everyone called him Uncle Abe. He was the father of Charlie Ferguson. Charlie's mother was buried in Bulter Co. Ky. When Uncle Abe died the water was up and passage to the burial plot beside his wife was not accessible.

Harry Cornellius (1894-1948) and Senie Cornellius (1905-1985) – They were both members of Horton Chapel. Senie was a sister to Eva McElwain. They were the parents of Bill Cornellius who was once a sheriff of Muhlenberg Co. Ky.

Vernon Lynn (1909-1988) - Senie Cornellius married this man after her husband Harry passed.

Tom Sherfield (1903-1971) and **Katie Sherfield** (1908 -1988) — These are the parents of Gene Albert Sherifield Sr. who is the wife of Marie Fulkerson Sherifield. Marie is the adopted daughter of Thront and Elise Horton Fulkerson.

A.E. Turner (Elizabeth) (1854-1936) – She attended with a son, Bill Campfield, who is buried in a grave marked with an unmarked concrete block, beside his mother. They were both members at Horton Chapel.

Jessie Turner (1891) – He is from the Elizabeth Turner family, not sure where.

Iva Turner Bradley (1908-1980) – She is also from the Elizabeth Turner family, not sure where.

Bill Campfield (no dates available) – He is a son of Elizabeth Turner who is buried beside her with the only marker as an unmarked concrete block. He was a member of Horton Chapel.

Ronald Milam (1928-2002) – The only known information, about this gentlemen is he wanted to be buried close to his mother.

Pauline Milam (11-11-1909 to 4-15-1978) – It is presumed she is the mother of Ronald Milam. They are buried next to each other. The ages would be right for a mother and son.

The following pages are preachers that have preached at Horton Chapel. Some have preached on a regular basis. Some have been visiting preachers either speaking an occasional Sunday or even an entire revival. Revivals have lasted anywhere from three days to two weeks at Horton Chapel. These speakers are not listed in any particular order. Every attempt has been made to include every minister who has ever spoken at Horton Chapel. Because of the quantity of speakers and the limited resources on the subject, there are sure to be some regretfully overlooked. Many do not have photos.

R L. Hines - He held the first meeting in 1912. The meeting was held in the Union Ridge building. He baptized several people from the result of that meeting. Gertia Fulkerson and Jenny Jones were the first to be baptized. According to a letter penned by Truly Joines, this meeting landed him in jail and Granville Horton and Willis Mohon bailed him out. Besides the first two people previously mentioned, he also baptized Dick Fulkerson, Jim Fulkerson, Bill and Luro Penrod, Bill and Ellen Horton, Thornt and Elise Fulkerson, Granville, Maudie, Dent and Tennie Horton.



C.K. and Mary Watkins (12/19/1861 — 10/31/1934) (3/5/1868 — 928/1959)

C.K. Watkins — He was the first preacher to speak in the new building. He preached a rotating schedule with Bro. Jim Barbee. C.K. Watkins was the first person buried in the Horton Chapel Cemetery.

Jim Barbee — He preached a rotating schedule with Bro. C.K. Watkins. He furnished the money to buy the windows, nails, doors and roofing for the new building.

R.E.L. Taylor — He held a meeting behind the Union Ridge building and several people were baptized. He is said to have held meetings in both the Union Ridge building and the new Horton Chapel building. He is buried somewhere in Tennessee.

Coleman Crocker — He only preached meetings here; however, the dates are unsure.

C.A. Ashlock — He came to us from Salina, TN. He held at least one meeting. He later moved to Bowling Green, KY and is buried in Warren Co., KY.

Allen Phy — He held several meetings at Horton Chapel. He spent his last years at Potter Children's Home in Bowling Green, KY. He is buried alongside his wife in the Franklin Cemetery in Simpson Co., KY.

Marshall Flowers — The only information given on him was that he preached at least one meeting.

Raymond Fulkerson — He was married to Gertia Fulkerson's daughter, Virginia. He has come on occasions and preached a sermon or two.

Jim Cox – He was a regular preacher for about 3 years in the early 1930's. He later preached revivals that would last up to 2 weeks. He married Bernice Hudnall at the young age of 20. She was a daughter of Ephraim Hudnall. He will be 100 years young 11/22/2007. He continues to preach at the age of 99 and takes daily walks.

Terry Graham – He was a regular preacher, perhaps in the early 1960's. He was a young man from Tennessee. He was full of life and quite the jokester! He was part of the crew who shivareed Ray and Anita Crafton right after they married.

Cecil Belcher – He was a regular preacher in 1959 — 1961. Little is known about him after he preached Adell Hunt's funeral in 1961.



John Hoover — He has held at least one meeting at Horton Chapel.

B. McPherson — He preached for a little while as a regular preacher during the early years.

Lloyd Spivey, Sr. — He was a regular preacher at Horton Chapel. The actual dates are unclear. He was here in 1939 because we know he baptized Dorothy Mohon at that time. She was baptized in Rocky Creek. He came to us from Paris, Tennessee. He is buried in Ohio Co., KY.

Roy Hyde — He held revivals at Horton Chapel during the late 1920's.

Willard DeArmond — He held revivals during the same time period as Roy Hyde. He held meetings at other area congregations. Once at a meeting in Beech Creek, Ky., Alsie Wells, a former member of Horton Chapel, was baptized.

Thomas Noel Hancock — He ministered to the Horton Chapel congregation sometime during the 1950's. He is buried in the Rose Hill Cemetery in Central City, KY.

Noel Quinn — He has held a couple of meetings with Horton Chapel. He came to Horton Chapel from Owensboro, KY.

Joe Sanders — He has held at least 2 meetings at Horton Chapel. He is a former teacher at David Lipscomb College in Nashville, TN.

Joe Gray — He has held a meeting and done missionary work.

Gary Puryear — He has held at least 2 meetings with Horton Chapel. He once attended Freed Hardman College in Tennessee.

Harold Sain — He was a regular preacher for a few short months. He later went to a congregation in Tennessee.

Darrel Puryear — He has spoken at Horton Chapel. It may have been one of those meetings where local preachers would take turns speaking nightly. He is a brother to Gary Puryear. He currently ministers to the Beechmont, KY congregation.




Forret Rhoads, Sr.

Vergil Joines and Forrest Rhoads, Sr. were best friends. They promised to preach each other's funerals, depending on who out-lived the other. The two young men started a two week youth camp organization in the Dawson Springs area in 1959. A vote elected Elvis Huffard as president and West Kentucky Youth Camp was established. According to a letter penned by Forrest, it is still going strong today and is a fine place to send your youth.

Garry Hill — He was a minister at Horton Chapel during the late 1970's to the mid 1980's. He came to Horton Chapel from Georgia, where he now preaches. He has much interest in archaeology. The Brewer family, which extends into the McPherson, Johnson, Farmer, Walker and Toomey families. The McElwain family extends into the Crafton, Moore, Cabbage, Burnette, Heltsley, Henson, Joines and Slaughter families. The Wells families that attend are all from the Marvin and Marcia Wells family. Juanita Coe and Dorothy Mohon are from the Fulkerson family of so long ago. Paul Mohon is from the Willis Mohon family. Jared Jones extends from the Willis Mohon and the Fulkerson families. The Luckett family extends into the Dukes, Phillips and Reed families.

There are smaller family groups which include the Hudnall family, the Heath family, the Lyons family, the Jay McElwain family, the Mefford family, the Morris family, the Napier family and our newest family members, the David Porter family. The Paul G. Moore family extends into the Wentworth family.

J.V. Hudnall is the last person to be baptized at Horton Chapel (as of the writing of this book). He is the oldest person, at the age of 84, that Paul Moore has had the honor to baptize. Frank Jones had held the record of being the oldest member to be baptized until this baptism on 7/17/2007.
